Be it remembered that a regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, Long Beach, Mississippi, was begun and held at 5:00 o'clock p.m., Long Beach City Hall Meeting Room, 201 Jeff Davis Avenue, in said City, it being the third Tuesday in February, 2022, and the same being the time, date and place fixed by Laws of the State of Mississippi and ordinance of the City of Long Beach for holding said meeting.

There were present and in attendance on said board and at the meeting the following named persons: Mayor George L. There being a quorum present sufficient to transact the business of the City, the following proceedings were had and done.

Alderman McCaffrey made motion seconded by Alderman Brown and unanimously carried to approve the following minutes of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, as submitted:

There came on for discussion Long Term Leasing Concerns, whereupon Mayor Bass recognized Michael Notter of 107 Shady Drive, Long Beach, MS. Mr. Notter expressed concerns of restricting access of public parks through long term leases. No action was required or taken.

It came on for discussion Army Corp of Engineers Study of Harbor, whereupon Alderman McCaffrey made motion seconded by Alderman Bennett and unanimously carried to schedule a work session with the US. Army Corp of Engineers, Andercorp and Overstreet & Associates on Monday, February 21, 2022 at 5:00 pm., Long Beach City Hall Meeting Room, 201 Jeff Davis Avenue, Long Beach, Mississippi to discuss the aforementioned topic.

Alderman Brown made motion seconded by Alderman McCaffrey and unanimously carried to authorize advertisement of the NRCS Improvements Trautman @ Magnolia project.

Mayor Bass and I recently met with John Wilson of Harrison County Utility Authority regarding the Sewer System Upgrade project currently underway. We were informed that there could be a potential overrun of approximately \$200,000. He assured us that they are doing everything possible to minimize this amount.

The City would have two options to fund this overrun. The first option is HCUA would in essence front us the money and collect it next fiscal year as an increase in our monthly payments. The second option would be to increase the SRF loan from \$4 million to \$4.2 million. This would increase our annual debt service payment by approximately \$11,000.

I would recommend Option #2 due to the low interest rate of .8% and not tying up the City's working capital so that funds are available to continue water/sewer improvements and for emergency repairs.

There came on for discussion Mosely Museum of Art Project, whereupon Alderman McGoey apprised the Board of the details of the project to include high school art students painting trash receptacles to be placed throughout the City. The right of way kick-off meeting for the Klondyke/Commission Road Intersection Improvement was held on Monday, January 31, 2022. We are now ready to start the ROW acquisition phase of this project. The first step of this phase is to select a Right of Way consultant to coordinate the acquisitions. I have attached an excerpt from the MDOT manual with a list of pre-approved consultants.

Rick Ferguson with Pickering Firm, who is the engineer for this project, informed me that he has previously worked with two of the firms on the master list. He has reached out to both firms to discuss their availability to perform this work. Unfortunately, Ridge Point Consultants, LLC is not able to take this project on at this time, but Price & Zirulnick, PLLC has confirmed they have the availability and are interested in the work.

My recommendation would be to select Price & Zirulnick, PLLC as the City's ROW Consultant for the Kondyke/Commission Road Intersection project.

There came on for discussion Harbor Update, whereupon City Engineer David Ball apprised the Board of pier design and launch ramp replacement. Harbor Master Bill Angley also spoke to the status of the lighting on the west side of the harbor. There was no action required or taken at this time.

OVW FY 2022 JUSTICE FOR FAMILIES PROGRAM MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING JUSTICE FOR FAMILIES COLLABORATIVE

WHEREAS, the Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence, Inc., (the Center) the City of Biloxi (Biloxi), the City of D'Iberville (D'Iberville), the City of Long Beach (Long Beach), Boat People SOS (BPSOS), Program Believe (Believe) and Brenda's House Family Center (BHFC) have come together to make an application for the OVW Justice for Families Program to fund the Justice for Families Collaborative project (Collaborative); and

WHEREAS the partners listed herein have agreed to enter into a collaborative agreement in which the **Center** will be the lead agency and named applicant and the other agencies will be partners in this application; and

WHEREAS the partners herein desire to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) setting forth the services to be provided by the Collaborative.

WHEREAS, in addition to this MOU executed by the governing authorities of the aforementioned units of local government and non-profit community partners, municipal courts of Biloxi, D'Iberville and Long Beach, the Harrison County Justice Court and the Harrison County Chancery Court have executed separate Letters of Commitment (LOC) evidencing their partnership in the project; and

WHEREAS the entire application prepared and approved by the Collaborative through its partners is to be submitted to the Office on Violence Against Women on or before March 7, 2022.

1.) IDENTIFICATION OF AND DESCRIPTION OF PARTNER AGENCIES AND COLLABORATIVE RELATIONSHIPS:

Lead Agency: Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence (Center): The Center will serve as lead agency for purposes of the application and performance of goals, objectives, and activities of the project.

Established in 1977 and chartered in 1978 as a nonprofit corporation, the Center is the oldest and largest domestic violence shelter program within the state of Mississippi. The Center first received IRS tax exempt status as a 501(c)(3) in 1978. Since its beginnings as a "safe house," the Center has provided shelter and essential and supportive services to more than 45,000 women and children seeking safety from domestic violence. The mission of the Center is to support and serve victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and family members of homicide victims; to educate the community; and to reduce incidences of violence. The Center is a multi-programmatic agency providing a comprehensive and holistic array of services to families and individuals in crisis due to domestic violence, sexual abuse, sexual assault, human trafficking and homicide in the lower six-county geographical region of Mississippi, including Hancock, Harrison, Jackson, Pearl River, Stone and George counties. There is a strong history of collaboration between the Center and the judicial systems of the partner entities. The Center's Court Advocacy program stated in 1996 serving misdemeanor courts in Harrison county. The Center's four Community Advocates and Chief Advocacy Officer currently provide services to victims of domestic violence in justice courts in Harrison County and municipal courts in Biloxi, D'Iberville, and Long Beach, as well as in a number of other jurisdictions on the Coast. The provision of legal advocacy and representation also has a long history - The Center's Legal Clinic, now known as the Northcutt Legal Clinic, started in 1999. Northcutt Legal Clinic currently employees two attorneys and one paralegal. Northcutt provides civil legal services to clients in George, Hancock, Harrison, Jackson, with a myriad of other agencies and organizations in the area to assist in meeting the needs of clients including Open Doors Homeless Coalition; Coastal Family Health; St. Vincent DePaul Society; Biloxi Housing Authority; Visions of Hope; Hope Federal Credit Union; Humane Society of South Mississippi; United Way of South Mississippi; Health and Handicap; Singing River Services; Jackson

County Civic Action; Head Start. The Center also has longstanding collaborative partnerships with local law enforcement agencies, courts, and hospitals.

Biloxi. Biloxi is a city located in Harrison County Mississippi. With a 2020 population of 46,680, it is the 4th largest city in Mississippi. Biloxi is one of the oldest communities in the country, having first been settled in 1699. The Center and Biloxi have a long history of partnership and cooperation, which includes regular training for municipal employees and the court advocacy services provided by the Center. Additionally, representatives of Biloxi have served on the Board of the Center. The Center and Biloxi are participating members of the Biloxi Coordinated Community Response team, which meets monthly to discuss issues related to the response to domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and human trafficking. Additionally, the City of Biloxi is a partner with the Center in its plans to develop the Harrison County Family Justice Center and has signed an MOU to engage in the planning and development phases.

D'Iberville. Named after Canadian explorer Pierre Le Moyne d'Iberville who arrived at the area in 1699, D'Iberville officially became a city in 1988. D'Iberville is located in Harrison County and has a total population of 12,721. The Center and D'Iberville currently collaborate in addressing domestic violence in meaningful ways. The court advocacy program is one example of the existing partnership and ongoing joint efforts.

Long Beach. Long Beach was incorporated August 10, 1905 and is located in Harrison County. Long Beach has a population of 16,780. The Center and Long Beach currently collaborate in addressing domestic violence in meaningful ways. The court advocacy program is one example of the existing partnership and ongoing joint efforts.

BPSOS. BPSOS is one of two Gulf Coast branches of a national Vietnamese-American nonprofit community-based organization with over 40-year of services. BPSOS has been in operation in Biloxi for the last 15 years providing direct services to the Vietnamese Americans in Harrison, Jackson, and

Hancock counties in Mississippi. Through culturally and linguistically appropriate services, BPSOS makes services available to all community members regardless of ethnic background. BPSOS and the Center have an established history of working together either through referrals or direct services to better meet the needs of victims of domestic violence

Believe. Believe is located in Biloxi and was established on March 1, 2019 by its founders Kay Home and Xenia Wickline. It started with a discussion between the two founders about providing a variety of resources for the underprivileged local community. That discussion evolved into the creation of Educational and Informational programs targeting the most vulnerable communities on the Gulf Coast. Believe is located in Biloxi, Mississippi. Believe serves the most underserved, vulnerable and low-income communities of the MS Gulf Coast with Educational Resources, (After School tutoring, Summer Youth Enrichment Camps, Adult ELL classes, Basic Computer classes for Senior Citizens, GED Prep), Legal Immigration Services (excluding U-Visa or VAWA), Citizenship classes and provide other resource information to assist the communities. Believe provides a bridge between the victim and the staff of the Center due to the language barrier.

BHFC: Operated under the purview of the Hancock County (Mississippi) Human Resource Agency, BHFC first opened in July 2014 as Brenda' House, a children's emergency shelter, designed to meet the high number of children in care at that time in Hancock County, and became a licensed emergency shelter through the MS Department of Child Protection Services in 2016. In April 2019, BHFC began the transition from children's emergency shelter to BHFC, becoming the first supervised visitation program in the state of Mississippi. BHFC's current mission is to coordinate and enhance positive and supportive parental/familial relationships and experiences for children that will cultivate cognitive, emotional, and social development, especially for those children who have been traumatized due to child abuse or neglect. The organization has as its purpose provision of supervised visitation (Family Time) for families in a comfortable home like setting; and to allow children to maintain and enhance

positive relationships with people who are important to them. Existing partnerships in this work include Hancock County CASA; Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence; and Hancock Resource Center.

2.) ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby agreed by and between the Project Partners as follows:

- The Center will serve as the lead agency for the proposal. The role as lead agency will include the following:
 - All grant administrative duties, including but not limited to submitting any required programmatic and financial reports.
 - o Oversight of the activities identified in the Collaborative project narrative by Center staff.
 - o Employ staff to serve as Domestic Violence Court Coordinator.
 - o Employ staff to serve as Law Enforcement Liaison.
 - Employ Legal Advocate to work under the direction of the director of the Northcutt Legal
 Clinic.
 - o Enter into contracts with non-profit partners for services under the project.
 - o Process any invoices for services provided pursuant to contracts.
 - Organize and provide training to other partners and/or attend training provided by other partners.
 - Leverage existing relationships with other non-profit community partners, who are not parties to this MOU, to increase resources for victims of domestic violence.
- The City of Biloxi will:
 - Authorize the Municipal Court Administrator or Municipal Court Judge(s) to submit a
 Letter of Commitment to submit with the application for the Project.
 - Authorize sharing of law enforcement and court information necessary for carrying out the purposes of the Collaborative with Collaborative staff and partners.

- o Provide data and/or reports for purposes of measuring performance of the Collaborative.
- O Cooperate in and direct its various departments, including but not limited to the police department, the court department (to include judge(s), clerks and security staff) and prosecutors, to participate in training provided by project partners the Center, BPSOS and Believe, with the understanding this training will be provided free of charge.
- Cooperate in review of municipal response to domestic violence, which may include review
 and modification of law enforcement, prosecution and court protocols and practices, or
 creation of new protocols and practices.
- Provide, when requested and if available, space for trainings and meetings in furtherance of project objectives free of charge.
- Provide space on as needed basis for grant funded personnel to carry out tasks related to the project.

• The City of D'Iberville will:

- Authorize the Municipal Court Administrator or Judge to submit a Letter of Commitment to submit with the application for the Project.
- Authorize sharing of law enforcement and court information necessary for carrying out the purposes of the Collaborative with Collaborative staff and partners.
- Provide data and/or reports for purposes of measuring performance of the Collaborative.
- O Cooperate in and direct its various departments, including but not limited to the police department, the court department (to include judge(s), clerks, and security staff) and prosecutors, to participate in training provided by project partners the Center, BPSOS and Believe, with the understanding this training will be provided free of charge.

- Cooperate in review of municipal response to domestic violence, which may include review
 and modification of law enforcement, prosecution and court protocols and practices, or
 creation of new protocols and practices.
- Provide, when requested and if available, space for trainings and meetings in furtherance of project objectives free of charge.
- Provide space on as needed basis for grant funded personnel to carry out tasks related to the project.

• The City of Long Beach will:

- Authorize the Municipal Court Administrator or Judge to submit a Letter of Commitment to submit with the application for the Project.
- Authorize sharing of law enforcement and court information necessary for carrying out the purposes of the Collaborative with Collaborative staff and partners.
- o Provide data and/or reports for purposes of measuring performance of the Collaborative.
- O Cooperate in and direct its various departments, including but not limited to the police department, the court department (to include judge(s), clerks and security staff) and prosecutors, to participate in training provided by project partners the Center, BPSOS and Believe, with the understanding this training will be provided free of charge.
- Cooperate in review of municipal response to domestic violence, which may include review
 and modification of law enforcement, prosecution and court protocols and practices, or
 creation of new protocols and practices.
- Provide, when requested and if available, space for trainings and meetings in furtherance of project objectives free of charge.
- Provide space on as needed basis for grant funded personnel to carry out tasks related to the project.

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BPSOS will:

- Engage in activities related to the grant by hiring or directing staff to provide court advocacy
 as described in the application to members of the Vietnamese-American community in
 Biloxi, D/Iberville, Long Beach and Harrison County.
- Provide training to project partners on topics related to working with survivors, DAPOs,
 etc. in a culturally appropriate and respectful manner.
- Provide reports of project activities to the Center for grant reporting purposes in the format prescribed by the Center.
- o Submit invoices to the Center for work performed.

• Believe will:

- Engage in activities related to the grant by hiring or directing staff to provide court advocacy
 as described in the application to members of the Hispanic community in Biloxi, D/Iberville,
 Long Beach and Harrison County.
- Provide training to project partners on topics related to working with survivors, DAPOs,
 etc. in a culturally appropriate and respectful manner.
- Provide reports of project activities to the Center for grant reporting purposes in the format prescribed by the Center.
- o Submit invoices to the Center for work performed.

BHFC will:

- Hire or retain staff to perform tasks related to supervised visitation and monitored exchanges and training.
- Provide supervised visitation and monitored exchanges in Harrison County at no cost to the victims.

- Participate in the planning and delivery of training to Guardians ad Litem, MS Child
 Protection Services, and Harrison Chancery Court staff.
- Provide reports of project activities to the Center for grant reporting purposes in the format prescribed by the Center.
- o Submit invoices to the Center for work performed.

3.) ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF UNDERSERVED POPULATIONS

The programs offered by project partners, BPSOS and Believe, are specifically tailored to address the needs of underserved populations. By using the relationships and trust already developed between these organizations and the individuals they serve, the project will have greater reach in these communities. These organizations have had significant input into the development of the project, based upon their experiences and observations.

4) PROJECT PARTNERS' REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF BUDGET:

Each Project Partner was provided a copy of the Justice for Families Collaborative project budget and, by signing this agreement, has acknowledged receipt and approval of the total requested budget as well as the budget requested for each Project Partner's collaborative services, if any. Project Partners BPSOS and Believe agree that the compensation for their services set forth in the budget is full compensation for the additional services to be provided under the grant. The cities of Biloxi, D'Iberville and Long Beach expressly agree and understand they will receive no compensation from the grant for their roles and responsibilities.

5) MEANINGFUL COLLABORATION BETWEEN COURTS AND NON-PROFIT, NONGOVERNMENTAL DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIM SERVICE PROVIDER

The relationship between the Courts and the victim service provider is detailed in the Letters of Commitment executed by the municipal courts of Biloxi, D'Iberville and Long Beach, and the Harrison County Justice Court and Harrison Count Chancery Court.

6) MEANINGFUL PARTICIPATION AMONG ALL SIGNING PARTIES.

Each signing party to this MOU agrees that it has had meaningful participation in the development of the Justice for Families Collaborative project and will fulfill the roles and responsibilities defined above. Each party is fully advised of the roles and responsibilities of other partners to this MOU.

7) PARTNER PARTICIPATION IN APPLICATION DEVELOPMENT:

While the Center has served as lead agency for the drafting of the Justice for Families Collaborative project proposal, each partner entity, agency or court has actively participated in its development. Each court has collected and provided data which is included in this proposal and have had the opportunity to review not only the budget, but the entire project narrative and make comments. Initial meetings to discuss the specific project began the week of January 24, 2022, but the cooperation and development of ideas began long before then. Multiple meetings and discussions have occurred between the Center and project partners. The municipalities have provided input into the processes necessary for execution of the MOU, early drafts of which were provided to them for comment and input. Additionally, individual meetings with court staff, including judges and court clerks and administrators have occurred with each municipality. Courts have assisted in the development of the project goals and objectives and ideas and suggestions made have been incorporated into the Collaborative project. Statistical data and other court-related information was collected and used in the development of the project.

8) PERSONS RESPONSIBLE FOR DEVELOPING AND IMPLEMENTING PROJECT ACTIVITES:

• Lead Agency: The Center is a private nonprofit, 50l(c)3 organization, with 45 years of experience working with victims of sexual assault and domestic violence, garnering community support for their programs, and overseeing grant development and implementation. Since 1977, the Center has established a proven record of implementing grants and carrying out their goals and objectives. With its leadership, the project staff will be ensured of immediate resources to utilize in meeting the

housing and supportive services needs of victims. It is governed by a 22-member Board of Directors that meets bi-monthly. The Board of Directors reflects the racial, ethnic, and social economic diversity of the Gulf Coast and includes at least one person who has been a victim of interpersonal violence and one person from the homeless community.

The Center's Key Staff for the Justice for Families Collaborative project are as follows:

- The Center's Chief Executive Officer, Stacey Riley, LCSW, will provide oversight of the entire Justice for Families Collaborative project. Ms. Riley has over 20 years' experience in victim services. Ms, Riley received her Bachelor of Science degree and Master of Social Work degree from the University of Southern Mississippi, and she has dedicated her professional career to providing therapeutic interventions, advocacy, and education to individuals who have been impacted by domestic violence and sexual assault as well as educating the community on these issues. Ms. Riley provides direct oversight for all of the Center's programs. Additionally, Ms. Riley serves on the statewide Human Trafficking Council that is spearheaded by the US Attorney's Office and the Mississippi State Department of Public Safety.
- o The Chief Advocacy Officer, Sarah Jones, provides direct supervision to the Court Advocacy Program. and will supervise the new position of Domestic Violence Coordinator and Law Enforcement Liaison. Ms. Jones has ten years' experience working with victims of interpersonal violence and has been employed with the Center since 2012. In 2019 Ms. Jones was named Chief Advocacy Officer. Ms. Jones received her Master of Arts in Criminal Justice from Wichita State University.
- The Director of the Northcutt Legal Clinic, Harry Yoste, along with associate attorney, Herbert Wilson, will provide supervision of the new legal advocate position. Harry Yoste, along with associate attorney, Herbert Wilson, provide legal representation and consultation with victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or cases of child

sexual abuse. The attorneys together have over 50 years of experience in domestic law matters. Harry Yoste has been with the Center since 2004 and has covered cases in seventeen counties. He has attended numerous national seminars on family law, domestic violence, use of interpreters, and trial practice. Both attorneys are graduates of the University of Mississippi School of Law.

- The NEW POSITION of Domestic Violence Coordinator for the proposed program will be hired upon announcement of funding. This position will require a bachelor's degree in psychology, social work, or related field. Considerable experience in the field of working with victims of domestic violence can be substituted for educational experience. The position will be responsible for providing follow-up services to domestic violence victims on behalf of the court partners after law enforcement officers have responded to a domestic violence related call. The position will offer referrals to community resources, including services provided by the Center, and guidance on upcoming court proceedings. The position will also provide training to court personnel on all topics related to working with survivors.
- o The NEW POSITION of Law Enforcement Liaison for the project will be hired upon announcement of funding. This position must have at least a high school diploma or GED and three (3) years of experience as a law enforcement officer with documented experience in work with domestic violence victims. Extensive knowledge of the dynamics of domestic violence and Mississippi domestic violence laws is required. The law enforcement liaison will provide training to law enforcement partners on domestic violence related topics include lethality assessments, investigation of strangulation cases, trauma-informed care, and domestic violence dynamics. Position will also provide case review services and assistance with developing and/or modifying protocols and policies in response to domestic violence related cases.

- The NEW POSITION of Legal Advocate for the project will be hired upon announcement of funding. Minimum requirements for this position are a bachelor's degree in social work, paralegal studies or related field, and 2 years of experience in law office operations. Three (3) years of experience in a legal office may be substituted for the degree requirement. This position will conduct initial intake screenings with victims of interpersonal violence seeking legal clinic services, schedule client consultations with attorneys, and provide client referrals to appropriate community resources. The Legal Advocate will prepare court pleadings and coordinate proceedings with court personnel and will also provide assistance to courts with prose individuals requesting domestic abuse protection orders.
- The Center's Finance Director, Marya Washington, has more than 10 years' experience working in financial management, has more than 20 years' experience working with QuickBooks, and has been with the Center since early 2022. This position will be responsible, under the supervision of the Director of the Center, for the financial aspects of grant management.

Daniel joined BPSOS-Biloxi in 2006 shortly after Hurricane Katrina devastated the Gulf Coast. He worked directly with the Vietnamese community with their recovery effort through case management program under Katrina Aid Today. Since then, he has leveraged his personal cultural and linguistic competencies to plan and implement a number of appropriate services and programs including: Disaster Case Management, Mental Health, Financial Literacy, Workforce Development, Community Against Domestic Violence, Health Awareness and Prevention Programs for individuals, families and communities in Biloxi.

• Xenia Wickline will provide the grant services for Believe. Xenia Wickline has been a senior Immigration Legal Service since 2012 and she is one of the founders of Believe. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Industrial Engineer from Albert Einstein University of El Salvador in 1996. In 2010, she moved to Biloxi and since then she has been involved in volunteer work helping the vulnerable communities especially the immigrant community. She served as a specialist in domestic violence and human trafficking immigration legal

services in a local non-profit organization from 2011 to 2018. She collaborated with Biloxi PD and local Municipal Courts as an interpreter. She received the Presidential award for her volunteer work in the community in 2012 from the Obama Administration. She has been serving as a Board member for Coastal Family Health Center since 2016. Currently, she is working as a DOJ Accredited Representative and Assistant Director at Believe.

Lisa A. Wilbourn LPC, MDiv, BFA will be responsible for oversight and provision of services of BHFC. Ms. Wilbourn is the Director of Brenda's House Family Center. The Municipal Court of Long Beach, Mississippi is executing this Letter of Commitment as evidence of its partnership and participation in the Justice for Families Collaborative. The Collaborative is a joint effort with the Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence (Center) and other project partners including the Municipalities and Municipal Courts of the cities of D'Iberville and Biloxi, the Chancery Court of Harrison County, the Justice Court of Harrison County, and community partners Boat People SOS, Program Believe and Brenda's House Family Center. The Court is unable to execute a Memorandum of Understanding and is submitting this Letter of Commitment in lieu of an MOU.

The Municipal Court operates as the judicial branch of the City of Long Beach, Mississippi. In Mississippi, municipal courts have jurisdiction over misdemeanor crimes which occur within the municipal boundaries. Municipal judges may conduct initial appearances in which defendants, including those arrested for felony offenses, are advised of the charges being filed, as well as bond hearings and preliminary hearings. Municipal courts also have jurisdiction over civil Domestic Abuse Protection Order proceedings upon petition when the abuse occurs within the municipality when the abuse occurs within the municipality, or the respondent resides in the municipality. As such, the judges, court clerks, prosecutors and court administrators have an existing base of knowledge related to the intricacies of criminal domestic abuse matters and the use of protection orders as a tool in conjunction with other measures to enhance the safety of families in which domestic violence is present. The municipal court administrator and clerk are responsible for the daily operations of the Court. Long Beach has one (1) appointed judge, and one (1) appointed judge pro tempore, who are both licensed attorneys. The two (2) prosecutors are part-time contractors with the City of Long Beach. Each of these individuals will be involved in the activities related to the Collaborative.

The Center and its programs are quite familiar to this Court. The Center's shelter, case management, and other supportive services have helped innumerable families regain a measure of self-determination, coping skills and safety. The Court Advocacy program in particular, has provided advocacy to myriad victims of domestic violence appearing before the court. The Center provides wraparound services to these individuals, meeting or making referrals to other organizations to assist in meeting their needs related to their abuse. The court advocates provide exceptional services which have proved of assistance to the Court as well as the victims. This court also utilizes another invaluable service – the Domestic Abuse Intervention Program (DVIP) - which is an eighteen (18) week class for perpetrators of domestic abuse, based on the Duluth Model. The goal of the DVIP program is to teach offenders alternatives to coercive, dominating, and violent behavior in intimate relationships, and to assist men and women to develop relationships based on equality by teaching skills and alternative behaviors. The Court is pleased to be part of the Collaborative.

As part of the Collaborative, the Long Beach Municipal Court is committed to the establishment of an enhanced program of advocacy and to building on already positive relationships between the court, law enforcement, prosecution and advocacy. The Court will allow the Center, through the newly created position of Domestic Violence Coordinator, to have access to court files for the purpose of engaging victims in the early stages of the criminal process before the Center's current advocacy program becomes involved. The Court agrees that access to the records will be in the Court only, and that no records will be removed from the Court. The Court agrees to provide the Domestic Violence Coordinator with the office space within the existing court facilities necessary to perform these tasks and understands this will not be a full-time position. The Court is committed to requiring training for all court personnel, to include clerks, security personnel and prosecutors, to be provided by the Center, Boat People SOS and Program Believe on issues related to domestic violence dynamics, the effective use of screening tools, danger and risk assessments including culturally specific issues which impact underserved populations. This training will be at no cost to the Court.

The Court is committed to cooperation in a review of court response to domestic violence, which may include review and modification of court protocols and practices, or creation of new protocols and practices which may include incorporation of regular screening and training tools and referral mechanisms to better assess and identify risks of domestic violence and ensure victims of abuse receive necessary resources. The Court will make its staff available for specialized training from the Center, Boat People SOS and Program Believe related to domestic violence, regular screening and training tools and referral mechanisms to better assess and identify risks of domestic violence and also culturally specific needs of underserved populations in the Vietnamese American and Hispanic communities in Long Beach. The Court is also committed to sharing any information or data as a result of the work with the Center for purposes of grant reporting requirements and program performance measurement.

The Center has provided the Court with the budget for the Collaborative, and the Court has reviewed the budget. The Court understands there is no local match required. The Court has also had the opportunity to review and provide input in the development of the Collaborative project. Several in person meetings have been held for the sole purpose of discussing the Collaborative and the Court's role. Additionally, the Court has provided statistical data used in the preparation of the application. The Court understands that the Long Beach Board of Aldermen, as a project partner, has executed an MOU setting forth its duties and responsibilities in the Collaborative, and will work with the Executive and Legislative branches of municipal government to towards achieving the goals and objectives of the Collaborative.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Over the years, Public Works has acquired numerous maps, plans, exhibits, and documents regarding the City's infrastructure. Some of these maps only exist in paper form at Public Works, in a single "invaluable" copy. Many of these maps are already fragile, are still deteriorating from use, and once lost, the information thereon will be lost forever. Overstreet & Assoc. can assist the City in digitizing these documents, using protective scanner "carrier sheets" to help protect the document.

We estimate that we could scan the most important, most at-risk documents (estimated at 300-500 sheets) at a fee not-to-exceed \$3000 under the terms of our Master Services agreement, including the cost of the scanner "carrier sheets". This is not a risk-free operation; the condition of many of these maps is such that each time they are utilized, small portions of the map tear and fray and may be marred such that the information shown thereon is lost. The proposed "carrier sheets" are specially made to minimize the damage from the scanning operation, however, even the process of moving the plans from one location to another carries inherent risk. However, we can think of no other feasible option to save these documents and we can only assure you that we will use the utmost care in the process.

If acceptable to the City, we estimate that we could begin scanning these most critical documents using the "carrier sheets" and the City's wide format scanner located at City Hall beginning in mid-March 2022.

At a previous meeting, the City took one-sided action to offer to continue to extend the bid with our successful low Bidder for the referenced project. However, since that time, the Bidder has informed me that his subcontractors (debris disposal sites and debris haulers) are unable to continue to honor the pricing structure offered at bid time, due to volatility across the national economy.

This letter serves to inform the City that the bids offered for this project in late September 2021 have expired and that the project must be rebid before we could proceed to construction. Obviously, it probably makes the most sense to delay the bid until we are assured of the funding status for the work, or at least assured as we can be through this uncertain FEMA process. Only minor modifications would be needed to the Contract Documents to rebid the project, and we could be ready to re-advertise/re-bid the project on short notice from the City.

Almost simultaneously with the advertisement of the referenced project back in early January 2022, we received late-breaking information about existing AT&T utilities which conflicted with the location of the proposed force main. We worked closely with AT&T as rapidly as we could to determine the exact extent of the utility conflicts, which is not yet fully finalized. Nevertheless, it is apparent to us based on current information, that AT&T must relocate a portion of their utilities in our proposed alignment, which will take approximately 6 months according to the involved AT&T personnel.

Therefore, we elected to cancel the bid to avoid the inevitable problems that would arise from trying to construct a project which was bid based on incorrect information. We are continuing to work closely with AT&T to develop a timely solution to these utility conflicts and would not recommending bidding the project until we can coordinate with a more assured utility relocate timeline.

We apologize for the inconvenience; however, we firmly believe that proceeding with the bid under the current conditions would only create extensive problems with the construction of the project.

AMENDMENT NUMBER 10 TO MASTER AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF LONG BEACH AND OVERSTREET & ASSOCIATES, INC.

LONG BEACH SMALLCRAFT HARBOR - HURRICANE ZETA PERMANENT REPAIRS (GEOTECHNICAL INVESTIGATION & REPORTING)

It is agreed to undertake the following work in accordance with the provisions contained in the Master Agreement dated December 1, 2020:

A. DESCRIPTION OF ASSIGNMENT

- In order to complete proper design of the structural bulkhead walls currently planned along the
 eastern and southern "shores" of the Harbor, a geotechnical investigation and report is necessary.
- Engineer will provide Basic engineering services necessary to perform geotechnical investigations and to prepare a geotechnical report with recommendations for structural foundation requirements:
 - a. This will include seven (7) soil test borings/cone penetrometer test soundings to approximately 75 feet below existing grade.
 - b. This will include laboratory classification and testing to confirm soil stratification and soil strength characteristics.

B. PERIOD OF SERVICE

 Engineer shall plan and prosecute the work to result in a completed geotechnical investigation and report within 60 days of the execution of this Amendment.

C. BASIS OF COMPENSATION

- D. Fees for the described Basic services will be in accordance with Exhibit C2 of the referenced Master Agreement, more particularly via the hourly rates included in Appendix 1 to Exhibit C.
 - a. Total of all fees for basic services shall not exceed \$5,300, without City approval.
 - b. Amounts payable to ENGINEER for services of ENGINEER'S subconsultant will be billed times a factor of <u>1.2</u>.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

We believe the emergency problems in the Royal Estates subdivision are now in the process of being finally repaired thanks to your authorization to proceed with repairs using our recent low prices from LJ Construction.

However, the sad news is that many of the sewer mains and manholes inspected across the City during the performance of the job need rehabilitation work, based on the recommendations of our Contractor, mainly in the Royal Estates and Green Acres subdivisions. The Contractor currently suggests that approximately 5,200 linear feet of sewer mains in their inspection areas need to be lined with "cured in place pipes" and that 20 manholes need to be rehabilitated. These rehabilitation efforts would cost at least \$202,000 under current contract pricing, which the Contractor has already informed us would not cover pricing increases experienced since the date of the contract execution.

While that seems expensive, it should be noted that the rehabilitation would prevent a "Royal Estates" style situation in over 5,200 linear feet of the City's sewer system, which is in our opinion, a worthy investment indeed. If these lines failed entirely and required conventional "open cut" style construction to replace, it is estimated that costs to repair/replace could easily rise above \$1 million, due to the extensive restoration costs (driveways, sidewalks, roadways, etc.). As noted above, this rehabilitation is a worthy investment; certainly a cost-effective means to invest in protecting and extending the life of your existing sewer infrastructure.

At this point, we are still evaluating the options and considering which sewer mains and manholes should be lined, all in conjunction with your Public Works department. Therefore, we do not yet recommend any action; however, we desired to make the City aware of the need for further investment in protecting the City's sewer system and we do anticipate soon making a recommendation regarding these needed repairs. If we and your Public Works dept. agree with the Contractor's recommendations, it is possible that repairs of this magnitude must be separately bid to avoid procurement issues (a \$202,000 increase represents a 78% increase in the contract value). We will advise as soon as possible about the suggested way forward.

AMENDMENT NUMBER 9 TO MASTER AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF LONG BEACH AND OVERSTREET & ASSOCIATES, INC.

LONG BEACH SMALLCRAFT HARBOR - HURRICANE ZETA PERMANENT REPAIRS (HARBOR EXPANSION)

It is agreed to undertake the following work in accordance with the provisions contained in the Master Agreement dated December 1, 2020:

A. DESCRIPTION OF ASSIGNMENT

- Engineer will provide Basic engineering services necessary to prepare construction plans, specifications, and contract documents for replacement of existing Harbor and associated elements due to damages caused by Hurricane Zeta. These services will include:
 - Preliminary and final design of Harbor expansion.
 - Preliminary and final design of Harbor improvements or mitigation, including coordination with the Harbor layout and configuration indicated in the City's 2020 Harbor Master Plan Update.
 - c. Prepare advertisement, receive bids, and make recommendation of award for reasonable, discrete phases (if more than one) of construction work.
 - Perform construction engineering for construction phase/phases of the project, including full time Resident Project Representative (RPR)/construction inspection services.
- 2. The scope of work covered by this amendment includes the described services for:
 - a. Expansion of the Harbor to the west, by the construction of new walls, removal of existing structures, dredging of expanded harbor basins, and miscellaneous elements associated with that expansion. Projects necessary are more particularly described as:
 - i. Northern Bulkhead & Charter pier
 - ii. Construction of a new Western Wall (the western limit of expansion & the western border of the proposed new channel)
 - iii. Removal of the existing jetty & extension of the Northern Bulkhead & Charter Pier to the new Western Wall
 - iv. Construction a new East Channel Wall (the eastern limit of the proposed new channel) & dredging the new channel and the new Harbor basin
 - v. Construction of a Western Parking Lot additions
 - vi. Construction of Pier Extensions for full utilization of expanded Harbor basin.
 - Designing hardening and other improvements to the projects in order to mitigate against repetitive losses in the future.
- The scope of work for this amendment does not include the below elements, each of which can be performed under separate agreement when determined necessary.
 - a. Topographic survey for the described projects.
 - b. Environmental permitting for the described projects.
 - c. Geotechnical investigation for the described projects.

B. PERIOD OF SERVICE

 Engineer shall plan and prosecute the work to result in a completed set of construction plans and specifications within 360 days of the execution of this Amendment.

C. BASIS OF COMPENSATION

 Fees for the above described services will be in accordance with Exhibit C3 of the referenced Master Agreement, more particularly via "CURVE B" in Appendix 1 to Exhibit C3.
