It was noted that Alderman Patrick Bennett was preliminarily absent and arrived later in the course of the meeting.

There being a quorum present sufficient to transact the business of the City, the following proceedings were had and done.

Alderman McCaffrey made motion seconded by Alderman Frazer and unanimously carried to approve the Regular minutes of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen dated January 18, 2022, as submitted.

The Mayor and Board acknowledged the No Quorum meeting of the Planning & Development Commission dated January 27, 2022.

Alderman Brown made motion seconded by Alderman Frazer and unanimously carried to approve payment of invoices listed on Docket of Claims number 020122.

The Planning Commissioner Appointment – At Large was tabled until the February 15, 2022 meeting.

Alderman Johnson made motion seconded by Alderman McGoey and unanimously carried to schedule a Work Session to interview the School Board Trustee Candidates on Monday, February 7, 2022 at 5:30 pm and Tuesday, February 8, 2022 at 5:30 pm., Long Beach City Hall Meeting Room, 201 Jeff Davis Avenue, Long Beach, Mississippi.

Alderman Bennett arrived at the meeting at this time.

Alderman Brown made motion seconded by Alderman McCaffrey and unanimously carried to schedule a joint work session with Harrison County Supervisors and Pass Christian Mayor and Aldermen on Thursday, February 3, 2022 at 5:00 pm., Long Beach City Hall Meeting Room, 201 Jeff Davis Avenue, Long Beach, Mississippi.

It came on for discussion Fire Station #3 – Mold and Mildew Issues, whereupon Chief Skellie was recognized to discuss. After considerable discussion, Alderman Frazer made motion seconded by Alderman Johnson and unanimously carried to contact a mold remediation specialist to provide a recommendation to remove and prevent the growth of mold and mildew in the station.

Upon further discussion, Alderman Frazer made motion seconded by Alderman Brown and unanimously carried to authorize Fire Chief Skellie to make proper living arrangements for firemen assigned to Station #3 up to and including procuring a temporary trailer for sleeping quarters.

Alderman McGoey made motion seconded by Alderman Frazer and unanimously carried to approve the following State-Local Disaster Assistance Agreement for Hurricane Ida (FEMA-4626-DR-MS) and authorize Mayor Bass and Chief Skellie to execute same:



STATE-LOCAL DISASTER ASSISTANCE AGREEMENT

DISASTER: FEMA- 4626 -DR-MS

APPLICANT FIPS #: 047-41680-00

APPLICANT NAME: City of Long Beach

This Agreement is between the State of Mississippi. Mississippi Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) and the undersigned State Agency, political subdivision of the State, private nonprofit organizations, or authorized tribal organizations (Applicant). This Agreement shall be effective on the date signed by the State and Applicant. It shall apply to all assistance funds provided by or through the State to the Applicant as a result of the above-referenced disaster.

The designated representative of the Applicant certifies that:

- 1. The representative has legal authority to apply for assistance on behalf of the Applicant.
- The Applicant will provide all necessary financial and managerial resources to meet the terms and conditions of receiving federal and state disaster assistance.
- The Applicant will use disaster assistance funds solely for the purpose for which these funds are provided and as approved by the Governor's Authorized Representative.
- 4. The Applicant is responsible for all costs determined to be ineligible or unreasonable by FEMA and/or MEMA. The Applicant is also responsible for the repayment of any de-obligations recommended by the DHS OIG and agreed upon by FEMA. Should the funds not be returned to the State in a reasonable time frame, then collection of such funds will be handed over to the State Auditor for action.
- 5. The Applicant is aware of and shall comply with cost-sharing requirements for Federal and State assistance. While the cost share is subject to change depending on the severity of a disaster, the minimum Federal cost share is 75 percent of the eligible costs. The normal cost share is 75% Federal and the non-federal share is split equally by the State and local. The exception is with PNPs who are responsible for the entire 25% non-federal share.
- The Applicant is aware that limited funding, which requires cost sharing, may be made available for mitigation of future damages.
- 7. The Applicant will establish and maintain a proper accounting system to record revenues and expenditures of disaster assistance funds in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards and OMB Super Circulars and A-133 as applicable and/or as directed by the Governor's Authorized Representative.
- The Applicant shall provide Quarterly Reports to the State which indicates the anticipated completion date for each
 project, together with any other circumstances that may affect the completion date, the scope of work, the project
 costs, or any other factor that may affect compliance of this Agreement.
- The Applicant shall comply with the Single Audit Amendments of 1996 under the Code of Federal Regulations Part 200 – Super Circular: Subsection 200.501. The Applicant shall provide copies of every audit report issued on the entity at the time of its receipt by the entity to the Governor's Authorized Representative.
- 10. The Applicant will give state and federal agencies designated by the Governor's Authorized Representative, access to and the right to examine all records and documents related to use of disaster assistance funds.
- 11. The Applicant will return to the State, within thirty (30) days of such request by the Governor's Authorized Representative, any advance funds which are not supported by audit or other federal or state review of documentation maintained by the Applicant.

- 12. The Applicant acknowledges that it is the Applicant's responsibility to ensure all Federal, State, and local laws, regulations, rules and guidelines applicable to any FEMA grant program are adhered to. If said laws, regulations, rules and guidelines are not adhered to, responsibility for noncompliance is the Applicants.
- 13. The Applicant will begin and complete all items of work within the time limits established by the Governor's Authorized Representative in agreement with all applicable Federal regulations.
- 14. The Applicant will comply with regulations implementing the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 44 CFR Part 17, Subpart F.
- 15. The Applicant will comply with all federal and state statutes and regulations relating to nondiscrimination.
- 16. The Applicant will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act limiting the political activities of public employees and 44 CFR Part 18, New Restrictions of Lobbying.
- 17. The Applicant will comply, as applicable, with provisions of the Davis-Bacon Act relating to labor standards.
- 18. The Applicant will comply with the flood insurance purchase requirements of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 which may require purchase of flood insurance.
- The Applicant will not enter into cost-plus-percentage-of-cost contracts for completion of disaster restoration or repair work.
- The Applicant will not enter into contracts for which payment is contingent upon receipt of state or federal disaster funds.
- The Applicant will not enter into any contract with any party which is debarred or suspended from participation in federal assistance programs.
- The Applicant will return all unspent federal funds for uncompleted small projects prior to requesting additional funds for other projects.
- 23. The Applicant authorizes the Governor's Authorized Representative to recoup the unspent funds referenced in item 22 above, by subtracting that amount from other federal funds owed to it for other approved work when the amount owed is larger than the refund.
- 24. The Applicant will comply with all uniform administrative requirements which are set forth in the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, Public Law 93-288, as amended by Public Law 100-107, and implemented by 44 CFR Part 206.
- 25. The Applicant shall first endeavor to settle any controversy or claim arising from or relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, directly with the Executive Director of MEMA, or designated representative, before exhausting any other remedies or appeals to other governing authorities.

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It came on for discussion Girl's Softball Lease, whereupon Alderman Frazer recognized Mr. Danny Davis, a member of the Softball League. Mr. Davis presented a proposed lease proposal for the girl's softball fields on Klondyke Road. After extensive discussion, Alderman Brown made motion seconded by Alderman Frazer and unanimously carried to table this item until the February 15, 2022 meeting. It was the consensus of the Board to direct City Attorney Steve Simpson, Recreation Director Bob Paul and members of the Softball League to meet and discuss legalities, proposed terms, advantages, etc. of entering into a lease.

It came on for discussion the "No Loitering" signs installed recently at the harbor. Mayor Bass explained that these signs were in place prior to Hurricane Zeta, and were being replaced. Police Chief Seal went on to explain that the signs weren't there to prohibit people from hanging out at the harbor, but per the City's Ordinance, it allowed the Police Department to remove unruly people. There was no action required or taken.

It came on for discussion launching sail boats from the Yacht Club, whereupon Alderman McCaffrey made motion seconded by Alderman Brown and unanimously carried to allow the Yacht Club to launch sail boats from their location after a clear path has been identified and marked by the Harbor Master. It was noted all launching would be halted when debris removal begins at the harbor.

It came on for discussion the condition of the Magnolia Run Subdivision property. Mayor Bass apprised the Board that no movement has been made to restore the property back to its prior condition as ordered by the Board in July 2021. Mayor Bass also stated that the property owner had recently inquired about a tree removal permit. After further discussion, Alderman Frazer made motion seconded by Alderman McGoey and unanimously carried to not accept any applications until the property has been brought into compliance.

The Mayor apprised the Board that a City holiday, President's Day, is the day after the Mardi Gras parade, which will impede clean up. Alderman Parker made motion seconded by Alderman Brown and unanimously caried to authorize Department Heads to allow their employees to swap the President's Day holiday for another day off to facilitate the cleanup and barricade removal after the parade.

Hancock Whitney Bank would like to offer the following contract terms for a period of two (2) years beginning February 1, 2022 and ending January 31, 2024. These options are valid for 60 days from the bid submission date:

Interest Rate: Balances kept in Public Funds NOW Accounts will earn a variable rate adjusted monthly based upon the 28 day Treasury Bill, as reported by the Federal Reserve Bank as of the last business day of the immediately preceding month. For example, if the 28 day Treasury Bill, as of December 31, 2021, was 0.06%, then the City's interest rate would be 0.06% for the month of January 2022. Interest accrues daily and is paid monthly.

<u>Service Charge</u>: The bank will charge fees based on the cost of Treasury Management products and banking services currently utilized by the City which are estimated at \$1,500 a month. This cost may vary and is based on the monthly banking volume and activity implemented by the City.

Earn Earnings Credit Rate (ECR): The Earnings Credit Rate is used to offset or eliminate service activity charges. The ECR, normally subject to periodic changes, will be fixed at 25 basis points or 0.25% on the City's accounts during the term of the agreement. The City would hold a compensating balance of \$9,000,000 in a non-Interest bearing account to generate sufficient earnings credit to cover the Service Charge. Any funds over this balance could be held in interest bearing Public Funds NOW Accounts.

Agreements and Contracts: All Agreements and Contracts that need to be executed between the City and the Bank for banking services that are to be provided under these Terms to act as the Depository for the City are to be adopted in their entirety by the City at a duly called meeting, and these Agreements and Contracts shall be spread on the Minutes such that they are reflected in their entirety in the Minutes of such meeting. The City shall furnish the Bank with extracts of the meeting Minutes that evidence such adoption of these Agreements and Contracts and the subsequent ratification of the Minutes of that meeting.

The Bank appreciates the opportunity to offer the above contract options. We look forward to hearing from the City and implementing our recommendations.

All of these projects were represented on the exhibit for the proposed City-wide traffic study which was reviewed and approved by the Board at their last meeting. If approved, we will prepare initial estimates using engineering judgment on the needed improvements and prepare the applications based on those estimates. The TIP applications will require resolutions by the Board approving the project and committing the 20% local match of the estimated project cost. applications will need to be submitted to GRPC no later than the end of February 2022.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

In June 2021, the City performed an asphalt overlay of Kuyrkendall PI, in the Royal Estates subdivision. The road was in fairly poor condition prior to the overlay, and furthermore, there were many concrete drive ramps which had been constructed by private homeowners in the past, presumably to less the bump when driving over the curb into their driveways. These drive ramps may help smooth the entrance into the private driveway, but they obstruct the flow of drainage in the curb & gutter and are non-approved additions to the City's road infrastructure. Sometimes, the homeowners add small PVC pipes to the concrete drive ramps to help drain the water past the obstruction. Even with these small pipes, sometimes these drive ramps often result in drainage water holding in the curb & gutter, unable to drain past the obstruction to the nearest drainage structure.

In order to lessen the impact of these drive ramps, the City has in the past elected to overlay asphalt into the concrete curb & gutter pan which helps to create a consistent slope for stormwater to flow in this newly created asphalt gutter pan. This methodology was chosen for use on Kuyrkendall, as it has been chosen on many other streets in the City, including in the Royal Estates subdivision. However, it's nearly impossible to fully drain the roadway when the existing roadway is in such poor condition and with occasional drive ramps still obstructing the drainage. Some small puddles remain in the gutter pan, but these often dry very quickly and are small enough to cause little or no concern.

The homeowner at 121 Kuyrkendall has requested that the City remove the asphalt that was installed in the gutter pan in front of the property and to restore the flow of the small PVC pipe (estimated 1" in diameter) which penetrated the drive ramp installed at some point in the past. The homeowner claims that stormwater holds north of the driveway much worse than it ever did prior to the overlay. We acknowledge that there is a small puddle holding north of the driveway, but we do believe it is fairly small. After some discussion with the homeowner and with Public Works, we believe we understand the work needed to satisfy the homeowner's request. Furthermore, Public Works could perform the work "in house", meaning there would be little to no cost to perform the work.

However, there is some concern that once the work is performed, that the final product will be unsatisfactory in performance and appearance to either the homeowner or the City. We request your direction regarding these homeowner-requested repairs. We will do our best to answer any questions about this situation that you may have, and upon your direction, we are ready to assist your Public Works department in this effort.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

After receiving no bids the first time this project was offered, the City was forced to rebid the project. After significant effort by Mr. Lawrence Stephens, the mechanical engineer, to secure potential bidders, we did receive one bid for the referenced project on January 25. We have attached a Certified Tabulation of the bid which was offered by KBM Solutions, LLC, at a price of \$59,490. It was originally estimated that this work would cost \$180,000.

The price is much lower than anticipated; however, Mr. Stephens has spoken carefully with KBM regarding the bid amount and they intend to honor their bid. On the basis of Mr. Stephens' discussion with the Contractor and on his recommendation, we hereby recommend the award of the project to KBM Solutions, LLC, in the amount of their bid.

Due to the significant budget savings, we also offer that the City could consider adding a few optional items which were excluded from the bid due to budget concems. These additional items were eliminated due to concems about the project budget, but they would certainly result in additional/further improvements in the performance of the City Hall HVAC system. If this is acceptable, we can negotiate a change order with the Contractor for consideration after the Contract is approved and executed.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

We have prepared plans and an initial estimate of costs to widen S. Mitchell Rd., which will also require the installation of culverts and drainage boxes along a good portion of the west side of the road. Although the road will still be somewhat narrow, the City has previously decided to widen the road by approximately two (2) feet to increase the safety and usefulness of the road. We have prepared an estimate of probable construction costs for various options related to widening the road, which are discussed below:

We estimate the cost to simply construct the widening of the road at approximately \$167,000, if the project were bid and performed under a normal construction contract. This amount is listed as Option 1 on the attached cost estimate, and would provide for no asphalt overlay of Mitchell Rd. after widening, which would not create the best & most aesthetic final product. The narrow strip of widened asphalt will be very difficult to construct with a smooth & very rideable surface.

Option 2 is to construct the widening similar to Option 1, but to include a full width overlay from Pineville Rd. to Pino St., for an additional ~\$55,000 for a total cost of

overlay from Pineville Rd. to Pino St., for an additional ~\$55,000 for a total cost of ~\$222,000 after widening. This option would create the best final product, with a widened road and full width overlay.

3. Option 3 is to construct the road widening per Option 1, but to include a single lane mill & overlay after the road is widened. This lane overlay would cover the widened strip of asphalt from Pineville Rd. to Pino St. and would cost an additional ~\$33,000 for a total cost of ~\$200,000. This option would create a very serviceable road, but the new asphalt would only be installed over one lane width, to cover the widened strip.

As mentioned, Option 1 is certainly constructable, but will likely not result in a product which is very smooth and rideable. Option 2 would clearly result in the best final product, but the cost is highest. We believe Option 3 would be acceptable, but it would only provide fresh asphalt over the widened lane, not the entire road width. Due to the significant difference in costs, we request the City's direction regarding the choice between these options.

Additionally, we recently attended a meeting between the Mayor and County Supervisor Marlin Ladner discussing the contributions which the County has agreed to make to assist in widening the road. Mr. Ladner did agree to provide County assistance in providing and constructing the limestone road base in the widened area and in providing the backfill material for the required culverts along the western side of the widened road. The County's assistance could potentially save approximately \$40,000 by performance of all or portions of Items 3,4,5, and 11 (all highlighted in the cost estimate).

Upon City direction regarding the methodology of construction (Option 1, Option 2, or Option 3), we could proceed to prepare all needed contract documents to bid this project or could coordinate with Public Works to construct the project "in house" if their schedule and capabilities permit. The

anticipated sequence of major construction items is: construction of the drainage improvements, construction of the widened limestone road base, construction of the final paving/overlay. We are ready to answer any questions to facilitate your decision and we await your direction on how to proceed.

> 2021 Sewer Inspection & Rehabilitation Emergency Sewer Repairs

Ladies and Gentlemen:

As you know, we have been working on emergency sewer repairs in the Royal Estates subdivision for several weeks, attempting to point repair the obviously damaged segments of mains and manholes. Two point repairs were satisfactorily completed nearly a week ago, repairing the segments of the system which we knew were inoperable based on observations from above-ground. Since then, our inspection Contractor has made significant effort to clean & video the repaired sewer mains without success. They have advised that the remaining length of the lines is so damaged that they can't even finalize the inspection, much less perform a "no dig" repair on the lines.

Despite all the cost-saving efforts we have performed, we are now left with no choice but to recommend that the City replace two sewer main segments in the Royal Estates subdivision (1 – approx. 120 feet on Congress; and 2 – approx. 190 feet on Royal Dr.). Both of these locations are near the intersection of Royal & Congress, where we have been working diligently for weeks to repair the system.

We estimate that replacing both of these sewer lines and restoring all damaged areas in the Royal Estates subdivision could cost as much as \$100,000, based on the unit prices recently used in the point repairs. We believe the conditions on-site still warrant an emergency condition. In light of this belief and in anticipation of your approval at the 2/1/2022 meeting, we will prepare an Emergency Repair Request for Quotes for this work in accordance with the above information. Once we have documents suitable for construction, we can either request quotes from multiple Contractors, or we could continue to work with LJ Construction using their prices from the previous point repair performed last week along with negotiated prices for any items of work for which we don't have pricing. This assumes LJ would be willing to continue to honor their prices for a new scope of work.

Sadly, the two destroyed segments in the Royal Estates subdivision aren't the only problems. Our inspection Contract discovered yesterday that a sewer main on Alyce Pl. is also collapsed, meaning a point repair will be necessary at that location also. We estimate this point repair could cost as much as \$20,000. We also believe this collapsed sewer main represents an emergency condition and we are now preparing documents which could be used to construct the needed repairs.

We therefore request your approval of performing these three repairs (Royal Dr., Congress Pl., and Alyce Pl.) as emergency point repairs, and we request your direction regarding the method of procuring the work (either by RFQs to local Contractors or negotiations with LJ Construction who
